

NEWS FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The global pandemic has torn families apart and stressed many small businesses beyond the breaking point. With our precious forests undermanaged, brimming with fuel, and crippled by the Bark Beetle infestation, the Creek Fire has wrought utter devastation on a scale that defies even the direst predictions by experts. The healing process is ongoing, and the recovery of the Mountain will take generations. Our mental and physical health, homes, and livelihood have been assailed in this trying time.

Stories of unconscionable tragedy pervade, but a safe harbor is concealed from plague and fire, a bastion against any form of disaster. That constant is our collective history and love of the Sierra. No catastrophe can take away our memories nor erase the labor of our ancestors. Our spirit is as strong as the glaciers, volcanoes, and tectonics that formed the Sierra we love.

The Museum of the Sierra is a cultural repository of our identity. A place where visitors and residents become inspired by human and natural forces. Our Museum is a magical place where science, technology, engineering, creativity, art, and culture motivate smiles and inspire imaginations.

Moving forward, we need help to pull out of the doldrums of the past two years. Sierra Voices is an educational program that invites guest presenters to share information that pertains to the history and culture of our beautiful area. This season will be our 12th. The program is held on the 2nd Saturday of the month from May through October at 1:00

pm in the Museum's media room. You will not want to miss this year's line-up!

May o8 – History Of The High Sierra Pack Stations – The Cunningham Family, Presenters. The Cunningham's will revel us stories about the three generations of packing in the local area. The family packing business was started in 1922-1923 by Vaud Cunningham and was continued after the war in 1948 by John's dad and uncle. They have packed people from Huntington Lake to Mono Hot Springs, Edison Lake, and Florence Lake. Listen to an afternoon of exciting stories, photos, and memorabilia on life In the high country.

<u>June 12 - The Sugar Pine Lumber Company, The Minarets, And The Western Railroad – David Rodrigues, Presenter.</u> David was born and raised in Pinedale, CA, the grandson of immigrants from Mexico, at the beginning of the Sugar Pine Lumber Mill in Pinedale. David joined the United States Marine Corps and retired after 20 years of service. When he returned to Pinedale, he discovered the rich history of the area and took it upon himself to start the Pinedale History Project. Since then, David has dedicated himself to collecting, preserving, and sharing the stories of his community.

July 10 – Surveying The Sierra – Katrina Olsen, Presenter. Surveyors were some of the first individuals to explore, document, and map the Sierra expansively. They were instrumental in developing our area, from railroads to dams to recreation and private ownership. Their measurements and monuments from the 1800s and early 1900 still control our modern surveys today. Join us as we peek back in time to see how they surveyed (equipment displays on loan from the Mount Diablo Surveyors Historical Society) and how the area has developed and evolved. This presentation will touch on some basic surveying techniques and specific surveys relevant to the local area. We will walk in the footsteps of the previous surveyors as we decipher their notes and plats and compare them with our current surveys. Ms. Olsen has over 25 years of experience surveying in the San Joaquin Valley and the surrounding foothills and mountains. She is passionate about her profession and local history.

<u>August 14 – The Creek Fire Revisited, John R. Mount, Presenter.</u> John will give a detailed overview of the Creek Fire. The subjects will include fire progression, factors affecting the Fire's behavior, and why the aftermath looks as it does today. He will also discuss what comes next and what we can do to protect our community in the future.

<u>September 18 – High Odyssey, Phil Bartholomew, Presenter.</u> Phil was born in Fresno in April 1935. A one-month-old, his parents took him to Huntington Lake, where his father worked for the Forest Service. In 1941 Phil began school at Big Creek (his mother began school there in 1921), and he graduated from Pine Ridge Elementary School in 1949. Following his graduation from Sierra High School, Phil joined the Air Force, and his last duty station was in Alaska. After the Air Force, he attended Fresno State College and graduated from there in 1962 with a degree in biology. In 1963 he was hired as an aquatic biologist with the California

Department of Fish & Game and retired as District Fishery Biologist in 1997. Shaver and Huntington Lakes were part of his district. During retirement, Phil gives talks on Sierra natural and cultural history and participates in public service projects. He says it has been a great life!

October 10 – The History Of The Chaffee Zoo – Jean Chaffee, Presenter. There are three key names in the park/zoo, Roeding, Nosey, and Chaffee history. Frederick Roeding and his son George pioneered the Fresno area with the building of the Central Railroad. George was a landscaper, which led to the creation of Roeding Park and, by accident, the zoo. The following 20 years saw the haphazard growth of the zoo. George died in 1927, one year before the zoo received accreditation. The arrival of Nosey the elephant in 1941 propelled a Zoo Society's forming and brought in 10 major animals in 10 years. This fast growth in many significant animals required the full-time service of a veterinarian. Dr. Paul Chaffee entered the exotic animal world when there was truly little information on these animals. Four years later, in 1965, he was appointed Director/Veterinarian. With that combination, he made significant changes in the care of zoo animals accepted throughout the country. The zoo's name was changed in 1990 with his passing. Measure Z passed in 2004, and the zoo has been on a growth trajectory ever since.

- 2) a Bronze, Business, Silver, or Gold Level Member.
- 3) a volunteer that has logged over 30 hours.

If you fall into one of the 2nd or 3rd groups listed above, and you wish to place your chair(s) at the amphitheater, you will need to check into the Museum on the day of the show between 11:00 am-4:00 pm, and you will be given a sticker for your chair(s). This procedure will allow us to know you have checked in.

If you do not fall into one of the above categories, you can put a chair out by checking in at the Museum between 11:00 am-4:00 pm on the day of the show and pay \$5 per chair.

Anyone that does not want to pay a fee is welcome at 5:00 pm. All shows begin at 6:00 pm.

We hope this will encourage more members and volunteer hours and mitigate the issue of chairs being set out without the Museum's knowledge.

We appreciate everyone's cooperation as we fine-tune this plan and hope that it will be an additional way to cover the museum expenses for these shows while also providing a suitable option for seating.

<u>June 25 – Rock Therapy</u> – We are excited to welcome back a favorite performance with Oakhurst's own "Rock Therapy". Rock Therapy is a six-member classic rock cover band featuring hits from Journey, Boston, The Eagles, Led Zeppelin, Heart, and more. This group always brings the audience to their feet, and we are more than thrilled to host them again.

<u>July 23 – Deja Too!</u> – Returning for their third visit, Deja Too consists of Jim "Gumbo" Furnas on acoustic guitar and national resonator, Jeff Hallock on harmonica, and Don "Hef" Heflin on acoustic guitar and acoustic bass. They have been playing together for over 20 years. They play acoustic blues, and down-home delta blues to Chicago shuffles, including original material with unique harmonica & guitar fingerpicking. The wide variety of grooves and soulful vocals will take you on a blues journey like no other.

<u>August 13 – The GillyGirls</u> – We are excited to welcome back The GillyGirls Band. The GillyGirls is a local family made up of two sets of twins, Savannah & Morgan and Hailey & Jillian. They enjoy playing bluegrass, southern gospel, and old-time string band music. Their music includes mandolin, fiddle, bass, guitar, banjo, singing, and even an occasional song with yodeling. <u>August 27 – Lance Canales And The Flood</u> – We are excited to announce, new to this year's Friday In The Pines Concert Series, Lance Canales & The Flood, a roots-blues influenced Americana trio from California. The Flood is made up of stand-up bassist Stan "Cadillac" Lum and drummer Eric "The Kid" Encinas. Encinas keeps the rhythm along with the crowd as Canales plays hollow-bodied, anger-fueled blues guitar. For more information, please visit their website Lance Canales & The Flood.

The amphitheater is a perfect venue for picnicking and relaxing while listening to great music. Chairs, blankets, food, and drinks will continue to be welcomed. HIKES FOR HISTORY 2021

All specifics are subject to change. Please watch our website or call the Museum to confirm.

We are resuming our successful FREE Hikes For History program. This will be our 5th year. Hikers should meet at the museum parking lot on the morning of the hikes. Please bring shoes, sunblock, and plenty of water. Hike organizers/hosts of CSHS are not certified hike leaders, may not have CPR/first aid training or experience, and are not emergency trained persons. They are not responsible for your safety but will do what they can to help in an emergency. We hope you can join us! These are "no-charge" events! No dogs, unless a certified service dog, are allowed.



June 26 – Huntington Lake Dams and Historic Winch House – Debbie & Doug Koerper, Leaders – After completing the SJ&E Railroad to Big Creek, the next step of the project was to haul the materials up to Huntington Lake to form the dams and penstocks to hold the water for the hydro plant below at Big Creek. We will be viewing the dams and discussing their construction. We will walk to the Winch House to observe the 2000' climb the railroad cars, loaded with materials, were winched up the steep hill to the bed of Huntington Lake. Join us with your sack lunch for an enjoyable and informative hike. We will meet at the museum parking lot at 10:00 am and carpool up to Huntington Lake. We will return by 3:00 pm. Doug Koerper will narrate the hike, a noted figure in the Shaver Lake community, with over 40 years working in construction in the area.



July 24 – Balsam Forebay – Bill Donaghy, Leader - This is a beautiful, easy, and mostly level 1.5-mile hiking/walking trail that provides public access to and around Balsam Forebay, which is a small reservoir that operates in conjunction with Shaver Lake's Eastwood powerhouse, the biggest powerhouse in the Central Sierra. It differs from other SCE powerhouses. It is a pumped-storage facility, meaning during times of low demand, the Eastwood station draws water from Shaver Lake up to a small reservoir, the Balsam Forebay. During times of high demand, water is drawn from Balsam Forebay into the Eastwood



plant for power generation. Part of our hike will include a discussion of many little-known facts regarding John Samuel Eastwood, a legendary figure in the development of the Central Sierra hydroelectric power system. We will meet at the Museum of the Central Sierra at 9 am and carpool to a parking lot approximately 8.5 miles northeast of Shaver Lake. The hike will include a discussion of flora and fauna of the region, a view of the Kaiser Wilderness area, a walk across the rockfill dam completed in 1986, and sometimes you can even see an Osprey nest at the top of a large tree. The forebay offers picnic tables and restrooms. This hike is an easy walk, mostly level, to a small lake, offering birding, wildflowers, and Kaiser Wilderness views. Hikers should meet at the museum parking lot by 9:00 am. Bring a sack lunch.



August 21 – Potter Pass – Meg Tallberg, Leader – This is a moderate hike of approx. 4.25 miles roundtrip. We will begin the hike at the 8,200 ft. elevation and climb up to approx. 9,000 ft. in elevation. It is a beautiful hike through red fir forests, lovely meadows, creeks, and stunning vistas. At the top, we will have a gorgeous view of Mt. Ritter and Mt. Banner. Don't forget to bring your binoculars if you have them. Hikers should meet at the museum parking lot by 9:00 am. Bring a sack lunch.

Vince graduated from Chowchilla High School in 1977. He attended Merced College and Fresno State on and off (mainly to avoid working on the family farm) through 1989. Vince worked part-time at PayLess Drug Stores as a pharmacy technician throughout his college days. In the fall of 1989, he began teaching at Roosevelt High in Fresno. But he soon decided that teaching high school was not for him. So, Vince returned to Pay Less Drug Stores (now known as Rite-Aid). In 1996 there was a shortage of elementary school teachers, so he returned to school to obtain a multiple subject credential to teach elementary school. He was hired as an elementary teacher at Martin Luther King Elementary, where he taught students from kindergarten to fourth grade. He later was designated as a teacher on special assignments to be math coach and later an intervention program director. He retired in 2018.

In 1996 not only did Vince begin his career as an elementary school teacher, but he also made the lifelong commitment of love to his best friend, Keith Davis. Keith and Vince soon after that bought 10 acres on Sharin Woods Road in the Pine Ridge area. They cleared the property of brush, drilled a well, and built their dream log home with the help of family and good friends.

In 2009 they bought Cressman's General Store and took on the labor of love to restore this community landmark to the level of its former glory days. In 2018 Vince retired from teaching and continued to help run Cressman's until September of 2019, when they sold the store.

Vince and Keith have enjoyed their retirement life even though there have been setbacks, including losing their home to the Creek Fire. They have made the most of things by traveling and volunteering in the community that they love.

CENTRAL SIERRA RESILIENCY FUND

RESTORATION • COMMUNITY • STEWARDSHIP

The Central Sierra Resiliency Fund is a community initiative held at the Central Sierra Historical Society, a California 501(c) 3 tax exempt non-profit organization managed by a Council of volunteers. The Resiliency Fund collaborates with other local, state, and national organizations to support the revitalization of the forests and communities surrounding Shaver Lake through land restoration, local stewardship, and efforts that honor the historical legacy of the Central Sierra region.

SOIL STABILIZATION

CSRF has been working in conjunction with community members, non-profit organizations and state/federal agencies to identify priority soil-stabilization areas and assist in stabilizing landscapes damaged by the Creek Fire. Sierra Resource Conservation District, People Food Land and NRCS have been valuable partners in these efforts.

Together with our partners, as of April 30, 2021, CSRF has:

- · Hosted ten anti-erosion clinics and community workdays
- Spread 42I bales of weed free rice straw
- · Provided I60 tons of mulch
- Dispersed 2,400 linear feet of wattles
- Given 1,300 sandbags

With the help of Cal Fire Nurseries and Southern California Edison, the Seedlings of Hope fundraising campaign, community members and dedicated foresters, CSRF has planted 9,335 seedlings, free of charge.

Our partners; American Forest, Mulholland Citrus, and Intermountain Nursery, are growing an additional 48,000 seedlings for planting in Fall 2021 and spring 2022 (soil conditions permitting).
